COVID-19 Housing Resource Roadmap (Version 2.0)

This COVID-19 Housing Resource Roadmap (Roadmap) is to assist state, local, tribal, and territorial (SLTT) leaders and other interested parties with navigating some of the challenges, as well as the resources, associated with the Coronavirus (COVID-19) pandemic. Specifically, the Roadmap describes how supplemental appropriated funds and certain ongoing annually funded federal programs can be used to implement potential solutions. Please note that this Roadmap is for general guidance purposes only and has been compiled with publicly available information or with information provided by sources that are publicly obtained. This should be viewed as only a starting point for navigating challenges and available resources. Additionally, the resources highlighted are available as of the date captured in the footer of the document and will be updated, as appropriate. The user should always directly consult the respective department or agency administering the federal program as the provider of a potential resource for current program information, as well as to verify whether proposed activities would be allowable under a particular program.

Navigating the Roadmap

The Roadmap is to assist in challenges that federal departments and agencies which work directly with SLTT partners have identified in delivering housing support. Although not an exhaustive list, the identified challenges that follow fall within four topic areas:

- Nonpayment of Rent or Mortgage
- Housing and Service Needs of Homeless Populations
- Housing and Service Needs of Vulnerable Populations
- Reduced Temporary Housing and Shelter Capacity

Tables for each topic area provide information on specific challenges, potential solutions, and federal department or agency resources, including federal funding and technical assistance which may be available. Federal funding resources are either universal or solution-specific. Universal resources, for purposes of this document, have broad applicability to the solutions presented within the topic area, whereas resources directly linked to specific solutions are limited to the challenge presented. This information can help inform decisions on how to apply funding to maximize resources and achieve recovery outcomes. Although the solutions are general in nature, additional considerations may be necessary to support those who may be at an elevated risk for contracting COVID-19, including those who may have physical, sensory, behavioral, or intellectual disabilities affecting their ability to conform to infection control protocols such as masking, hand washing, or distancing.



Challenge 1: Nonpayment of Rent or Mortgage

Unemployed and Low- and Moderate-Income Persons: Households experiencing unemployment or having income below 80% of area median income may have an increased risk of eviction or foreclosure due to loss of employment and income, creating an inability to make rent or mortgage payments. Tribal households facing financial hardship may qualify for financial assistance provided through HUD Public and Indian Housing Programs.

The <u>Legal Services Corporation</u> and legal assistance available through the <u>Older Americans Act (HUD/ACL)</u> can provide assistance for legal aid interventions for individuals facing eviction and homelessness.

Treasury is administering a new <u>Homeowner Assistance Fund</u> to prevent mortgage delinquencies and defaults, foreclosures, loss of utilities or home energy services, and displacement of homeowners experiencing financial hardship.

HUD also offers <u>resources for renters</u> impacted by COVID-19. Some of these resources include tips to communicate with landlords; overview of CARES Act eviction protections; and link to database of Coronavirus-related protections by state.

The USDA Rural Development (RD) <u>Single Family Housing Direct Home Loans</u> and <u>Multi-Family Housing Loan Guarantees</u> programs can provide financing to qualified borrowers to increase the supply of affordable rental housing for low- and moderate-income individuals and families in eligible rural areas and towns.

Effective September 4, 2020, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) announced the issuance of an Order under Section 361 of the Public Health Service Act to <u>temporarily halt residential evictions</u> to prevent the further spread of COVID-19.

Challenge 2: Housing and Service Needs of Homeless Populations

Homeless Populations: Homeless populations, including veterans and families, may required additional targeted assistance to provide temporary housing and shelter sites with appropriate and safe services, supplies, and adequate staffing. Elderly populations may also have economic and social challenges that increase housing and service needs. Some resources can support transitioning to more permanent housing solutions.

Health centers are community-based and patient-directed organizations that deliver comprehensive, culturally competent, high-quality primary health care services. Health centers also often integrate access to pharmacy, mental health, substance use

disorder, and oral health services in areas where economic, geographic, or cultural barriers limit access to affordable health care services. Health centers deliver care to the nation's most vulnerable individuals and families, including people experiencing homelessness, agricultural workers, residents of public housing, and the Nation's veterans. Challenge 3: Housing and Service Needs of Vulnerable Populations

Populations with Disabilities and Access and Functional Needs (AFN): The CDC indicates that adults with disabilities are three times more likely than adults without disabilities to have heart disease, stroke, diabetes, or cancer, potentially increasing their risk complications associated with COVID-19. Safe and secure housing is critical to reducing exposure. There are specific housing resources available for populations with disabilities and AFN. In addition, elderly populations may have specific economic and social needs that contribute to housing challenges.

Additional Guidance for Housing and Service Needs of Vulnerable Populations

For these individuals, non-congregate sheltering is safter than living in communal settings. When this is not possible, guidance for households living in close quarters and people living in shared housing should be considered. The USDA RD <u>Single Family Housing Repair Loans & Grants</u> program can provide loans to qualified borrowers to repair, improve, or modernize homes or remove health and safety hazards.

Health centers are community-based and patient-directed organizations that deliver comprehensive, culturally competent, high-quality primary health care services. Health centers also often integrate access to pharmacy, mental health, substance use disorder, and oral health services in areas where economic, geographic, or cultural barriers limit access to affordable health care services. Health centers deliver care to the nation's most vulnerable individuals and families, including people experiencing homelessness, agricultural workers, residents of public housing, and the Nation's veterans. Challenge 4: Reduced Temporary Housing and Shelter Capacity

Populations Requiring Socially-Distant and Non-Congregate Sheltering Due to Health Considerations: Some individuals or households may need alternative housing options in support of public health mitigation measures, including social distancing, diminishing contact with high risk individuals, reducing shelter capacity, and accommodating retrofits that protect public health.

Seasonal and Migrant Workers: Housing capacity for seasonal and migrant workers may be reduced due to public health mitigation measures. Reduced housing may affect agricultural production, recreation, and key industrial capacity and cause economic disruption.

Additional Guidance for Reduced Temporary Housing and Shelter Capacity

To support demand for non-congregate sheltering, the American Hotel and Lodging Association (AHLA), in conjunction with the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services (HHS), has developed a <u>national database</u> of hotels and hospitality facilities that can support with sheltering. The AHLA also links to resources such as <u>Hospitality Helps</u> which connects lodging providers willing to provide available beds to hospitals and government agencies which need additional beds.

Seasonal and Migrant workers face unique challenges, as often workers are provided housing by their employers. These houses are typically communal thus at higher risk for COVID-19 transmission. The USDA provides a list of potential <u>resources</u> to support seasonal farmworker housing. the CDC shares considerations for agriculture workers. In circumstances where non-congregate housing is unavailable, housing providers and residents should take extra precautions as outlined in CDC <u>guidance</u> for Shared Housing, and guidance for <u>households living in close quarters</u> and people <u>living in shared housing</u>. The HUD <u>Self-Help Home</u> <u>Ownership Opportunity</u> Program provides grants to develop non-luxury housing for low-income families and persons who otherwise would be unable to purchase a house, and may be another option to consider to address housing challenges.
