

Don't Wait to Return Home to Apply for FEMA Assistance

Residents and members of the Mescalero Apache Tribe and Lincoln County, who have damage from the South Fork and Salt Fires may be eligible for federal disaster assistance from the FEMA Individual Assistance grant program. It may be weeks before everyone can return to their property to assess the damage. You can apply now for federal assistance, before you return home, even without insurance adjustor information.

Apply Now

Impacted Individuals and households in the **Mescalero Apache Tribe and Lincoln County** do **not** need to wait to return home or to hear from your insurance company to apply for FEMA assistance. If you have insurance, file your claim first, and then apply with FEMA.

How to Apply for FEMA Assistance

If you live in the designated areas approved for federal assistance, you may complete an application for FEMA assistance now. There are three ways to apply for FEMA assistance:

- The fastest and easiest way to apply is by visiting disasterassistance.gov/ and creating a disaster assistance account.
- Download the FEMA app
- If it is not possible to apply online, call the FEMA Helpline at 800-621-3362. The toll-free telephone lines operate from 7 a.m. to 10 p.m. MT, seven days a week. If you use a relay service, such as video relay service (VRS), captioned telephone service or others, give FEMA the number for that service. Multilingual operators are available (press 2 for Spanish).
