## **FEMA Updates Flood Maps in Douglas County**

**OAKLAND, Calif.** — The Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) has delivered preliminary flood maps for unincorporated Douglas County and the Washoe Tribe of Nevada and California. The maps identify revised flood hazards along Carson River, Carson River East Fork, and Carson River West Fork. The new maps will help building officials, contractors and homeowners make effective mitigation decisions, thereby contributing to safer and more disaster resilient communities.

Before the new Flood Insurance Rate Maps (FIRMs) become effective, there is a 90-day appeal period from April 11 to July 10, 2024. During that time, residents or businesses with supporting technical and scientific information, such as detailed hydraulic or hydrologic data, can appeal the flood risk information on the preliminary maps, which can be viewed at <a href="mailto:fema.gov/preliminaryfloodhazarddata">fema.gov/preliminaryfloodhazarddata</a>.

Flood hazards are dynamic and change frequently for many reasons, including weather patterns, erosion and community development. Officials from FEMA, Douglas County and the Washoe Tribe of Nevada and California worked together to provide updated information that accurately reflects the flood risk. These changes may also affect future building standards or insurance requirements.

The local mapping project is part of a national effort led by FEMA to increase local knowledge of flood risks and support actions to address and reduce the effects of flooding on new and improved structures. FEMA encourages residents to review the preliminary flood maps to learn about local flood risks, potential future flood insurance requirements and identify any concerns or questions about the information provided.

Risk of flooding affects almost every corner of the nation. In total, 98% of counties have experienced a flood event, which makes floods the most common and widespread of all weather-related natural disasters.
