Here are some key facts about how FEMA assistance can help kickstart your recovery after a disaster.

FEMA Can Provide Eligible Individuals and Households with:

Housing Assistance

- Lodging Expenses, Home Repair or Replacement
- Privately Owned Roads and Bridges
- Damaged Wells and Septic
- Rental Assistance
- Displacement Assistance
- Hazard Mitigation

Other Needs Assistance

- Disaster Related Moving Expenses
- Disaster Related Funeral Expenses
- Damaged Essential Household Items
- Damage to an Essential Vehicle
- Essential Household Items

FEMA Also Assists Local Governments & Private Non-Profits

After a disaster, communities may need help covering the costs associated with life-saving emergency protective measures, debris removal or restoring public infrastructure. FEMA's Public Assistance Program provides supplemental grants to state, tribal, territorial, and local governments and certain types of private non-profits so communities can quickly respond to and recover from major disasters or emergencies.

FEMA Does NOT:

- Block or prevent debris removal.
- Confiscate or seize property. Any information collected at your property inspection is used to determine the type and amount of assistance you may be eligible for.
- Replace insurance. If you have insurance, contact your provider first.
- Make you whole after a disaster. Assistance is designed to help you get started with your recovery.

Apply for FEMA Assistance

Homeowners and renters affected by disaster can apply for federal assistance in several ways:

- Online to DisasterAssistance.gov (fastest option)
- Via the FEMA App (fema.gov/about/news-multimedia/mobile-products)
- Calling 800-621-3362 (If you use a relay service, such as Video Relay Service (VRS), captioned telephone or other service, give FEMA your number for that service.)
