## Preliminary Damage Assessment Report

# **Kentucky – Severe Storms, Flooding, Landslides, and Mudslides FEMA-4595-DR**

## Declared April 23, 2021

On April 6, 2021, Governor Andy Beshear requested a major disaster declaration due to severe storms, flooding, landslides, and mudslides during the period of February 27 to March 14, 2021. The Governor requested Individual Assistance for nine counties, Public Assistance for 25 counties, and Hazard Mitigation for the entire commonwealth. During the period of March 10 to April 3, 2021, joint federal, commonwealth, and local government Preliminary Damage Assessments (PDAs) were conducted in the requested areas and are summarized below. PDAs estimate damages immediately after an event and are considered, along with several other factors, in determining whether a disaster is of such severity and magnitude that effective response is beyond the capabilities of the commonwealth and the affected local governments, and that Federal assistance is necessary. <sup>1</sup>

On April 23, 2021, President Biden declared that a major disaster exists in the Commonwealth of Kentucky. This declaration made Individual Assistance requested by the Governor available to affected individuals and households in Breathitt, Clay, Estill, Floyd, Johnson, Lee, Magoffin, Martin, and Powell Counties. This declaration also made Public Assistance requested by the Governor available to commonwealth and eligible local governments and certain private nonprofit organizations on a cost-sharing basis for emergency work and the repair or replacement of facilities damaged by severe storms, flooding, landslides, and mudslides in Boyd, Breathitt, Carter, Casey, Cumberland, Elliott, Floyd, Franklin, Jackson, Johnson, Knott, Knox, Lawrence, Lee, Lincoln, Magoffin, Marion, Martin, Mason, Morgan, Ohio, Pike, Powell, Rockcastle, and Wolfe Counties. Finally, this declaration made Hazard Mitigation Grant Program assistance requested by the Governor available for hazard mitigation measures for the entire commonwealth.<sup>2</sup>

<sup>1</sup> The Preliminary Damage Assessment (PDA) process is a mechanism used to determine the impact and magnitude of damage and resulting needs of individuals, businesses, public sector, and community as a whole. Information collected is used by the State as a basis for the Governor's request for a major disaster or emergency declaration, and by the President in determining a response to the Governor's request (44 CFR § 206.33).

O Destroyed – total loss of structure, structure is not economically feasible to repair, or complete failure to major structural components (e.g., collapse of basement walls/foundation, walls or roof);

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When a Governor's request for major disaster assistance under the Robert T. Stafford Disaster Relief and Emergency Assistance Act, as amended (Stafford Act) is under review, a number of primary factors are considered to determine whether assistance is warranted. These factors are outlined in FEMA's regulations (44 CFR § 206.48). The President has ultimate discretion and decision making authority to declare major disasters and emergencies under the Stafford Act (42 U.S.C. § 5170 and § 5191).

o Major Damage – substantial failure to structural elements of residence (e.g., walls, floors, foundation), or damage that will take more than 30 days to repair;

Minor Damage – home is damaged and uninhabitable, but may be made habitable in short period of time with repairs; and

o Affected – some damage to the structure and contents, but still habitable.
