Review and Adopt your Plan



Include Statement of Assurances

- Affirms that your Tribe understands and will comply with all applicable Federal statutes and regulations for the grant period
- Affirms your Tribe will amend the plan when necessary to reflect changes in Tribal or Federal law
- Can go in the plan or in the adoption resolution








Review and Gather Comments


- Review your plan with the planning team
- Make available to Tribal members
- Publicize comment period
- Present to Tribal officials

Tribal

Tribe Coordinates Review with State


Submit to State for review

Submit to FEMA Region for review

FEMA notifies Tribe plan is "approvable pending adoption"

Tribal Council adopts plan and submits resolution

FEMA issues approval letter and final review





Plan Adoption

- Signals a commitment to mitigation and Tribal resilience
- Can be by resolution, executive order, notice of action, or other format
- Must take place within 1 year of receiving approvable-pendingadoption status






Putting your Plan into Action



Risk Reduction Requires Action

- Implement plan to:
 - Protect Tribal members and guests
 - Maintain public safety
 - Protect historical and sacred sites
 - Prevent damage to Tribal assets
 - Reduce costs of disaster response and recovery
 - Improve Tribal capabilities
 - Develop safely and sustainably





What is the timeline?




How will it be funded?



Common Challenges

- Competing and changing priorities
- Lack of interest or knowledge of mitigation
- Lack of funding and resources
- Insufficient political will
- Disconnect with day-to-day operations





Challenges

- Hazard mitigation is not a community priority
 - Not a typical planning function
 - Competition with other priorities
 - Framework of development and property rights
- Capabilities may not exist:
 - Lack of political will
 - Lack of actionable data
 - Lack of incentives






Possible Solutions

 Listen to Tribal leaders and members when it comes to plan implementation and integration efforts


Balance competing priorities





Possible Solutions

- Make Tribal leaders aware of the benefits of plan integration and implementation
- Incentivize mitigation planning
- Expand local capacity for mitigation

Setting Up for Success

- Use post-disaster recovery period
- Focus on early wins
- Encourage champions
- Maintain your engagement
- Focus on quality over quantity
- Build on existing strengths
- Develop strong messaging
- Celebrate success!





Use the Post-Disaster Recovery Period

- Take advantage of public interest and political will
- Funding opportunities to address problems
- Recover with mitigation in mind





Focus on Early Wins

- Demonstrating success and progress can quickly go a long way toward gaining support
- Try to complete a few low-cost actions that can be implemented quickly





Encourage Champions

- Champions should:
 - Be credible with the community
 - Understand your plan
 - Be able to communicate it to others
- Look to the organizations that are identified in the action plan





Maintain Your Engagement


- Leverage your partnerships to:
 - Share ideas and best practices to address risk
 - Ensure efforts are not duplicated
 - Ensure resources are utilized effectively and efficiently
 - Identify potential funding sources





Focus on Quality over Quantity

- Identify and focus on projects that target the highest risks and your greatest community needs
- Balance available staff and the time allotted to the project
- Plans can always be revised to include future projects





Build on Existing Strengths


 Look at existing programs and plans to match with mitigation actions and proposed projects.





Develop Strong Messaging

Tailor the message to your audience

- Identify potential sources of funding to implement mitigation actions


There are a wide range of mitigation funding opportunities. It is okay to get creative!



Mitigation Funding Sources

- Private funding
- Non-governmental funding
- Tribal/local funding
- State and Federal government funding
- FEMA programs





Types of Mitigation Funding and Assistance

- Grants
- Loans
- Tribal revenue
- Technical assistance
- In-kind services and materials





Private Funding

- Individuals may complete their own mitigation projects or cover a portion of the cost of mitigation measures for their property.
 - All or part of the non-federal share up to 25% of the project cost
 - Increases the likelihood of buy-in

Hazard Mitigation Grant Program (HMGP)

- Goal: Help communities implement hazard mitigation measures following a Presidential major disaster declaration
- Funded post-disaster
- No mitigation plan requirement for the development of a new mitigation plan for sub-recipients
- Funds hazard mitigation plans and projects for all hazards



Pre-Disaster Mitigation Grant Program (PDM)

- Annually funded (by appropriation) program; not tied to disasters
- Goal: Reduce overall risk to the population and structures from future hazards
- Federally recognized Tribal governments may apply directly to FEMA for PDM grant funds for mitigation planning and all-hazard mitigation projects
- Funds hazard mitigation plans and projects for all hazards



Flood Mitigation Assistance Program (FMA)

- Goal: Reduce long-term risk of flood damage to structures insured in the NFIP
- Annually funded by appropriation (non-disaster)
- Mitigation plan requirement applies for recipients
- No mitigation plan requirement for the development of a new mitigation plan for sub-recipients
- Tribe must be in the NFIP
- Funds both flood portion of hazard mitigation plans and flood mitigation projects only
