Flooding is the most common and costly natural disaster in the United States. Floods can happen anywhere, not just in mapped flood zones and far from rivers or floodplains. Urban flooding can be an issue when storm drains get clogged with leaves or snow. Homeowners can find their home flooded when their neighbors do not.

"You can't control the weather but you can prepare for it," FEMA Regional Administer Mike O'Hare said. "Clear your storm drains and check your insurance policy ahead of winter storms to protect the life you've built."

Prepare Now:

- Floods are not covered by most home insurance policies. Get coverage under the National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP).
